GENERAL AIM:

The unit contributes to the DipBT course by demonstrating how the biblical and theological core elements might be harnessed in engaging with people from an Islamic background with the gospel of the Lord Jesus. It focuses on providing the historical, theological and cultural background necessary to understand and engage with people from an Islamic background.

The purpose of this unit is to move beyond theory and abstraction, and to give students a guided experience of engaging in personal, evangelistic ministry.
